
Progress on the New Garden


Music and Event Players

parishioners of St. Aidan's appreciated our participation. They look forward to future cooperation with our Parish."





Last month I wrote that although there were certainly Christians in Roman Britain before 300, we have precious little evidence about them that's historically sound. But once we get to about 300, the evidence increases substantially.

Archeology

Some evidence is archeological. Here's just one example: a mosaic bust that probably represents Jesus, as identified by the X and P (the Greek letters chi and rho, which are the first letters of the word Christos). This was discovered in 1963 and is now on display at the British Museum in London. It was part of a large floor mosaic in the English county of Dorset. Was it the floor of a church? We don't know. Interestingly, other parts of the floor mosaic depicted pagan themes. Were paganism and Christianity seen to be compatible? or were pagan themes reinterpreted in a Christian way (as Christmas trees would be in later centuries)? or was it just that the room was used for both Christian and non-Christian purposes?



And who decided that it was okay to represent Jesus in a work of art? Didn't the Ten Commandments prohibit image-making? I'll come back to these questions in a later chapter in this series.

England's "proto-martyr"

The early 300s may also be when Britain's first great martyr, St. Alban, was executed. (Some date him earlier.) He was a pagan who impulsively decided to hide a Christian fugitive in his home, in the way that some Dutch folks in Amsterdam hid Jews during the Nazi occupation. The surprise was that when the authorities came looking for the Christian, Alban presented himself to them, in place of the Christian. Then at his trial he declared himself a follower of the true God. The account of his execution includes several miracles, such as a spring of water breaking through at the place of his execution.

The cathedral of the diocese of St. Alban, north of London, marks the place of his execution. The well is nearby.

A British Heretic

One of the greatest heretics of the early Church was a fourth-century British monk named Pelagius, although he made his reputation after he moved to Rome. He insisted that people should lead sinless lives after they were baptized, by simply willing themselves to be perfect. His views were challenged by St. Augustine, who thought that sin was too deeply rooted in fallen human nature to be simply wished away by good intentions.

Pelagianism has sometimes been called "the British heresy," since many Anglicans (and Methodists and Puritans too) have seemed inclined to a kind of judgmental moralism that doesn't acknowledge the frailties of human nature or the constraints of difficult circumstances. - Continued on Page 8 BACK TO PAGE 1



They have therefore underestimated how much we have to rely on God's grace. (This isn't to say that moral behaviour isn't important!)

Constantine

In 306 a young man named Constantine, who was living in York, was promoted to the rank of emperor. That's a complicated story that I won't get into, but you probably know that the Emperor Constantine had a profound impact on Church history. He ended the persecutions of Christians in 313 CE, promoted bishops to positions of social importance, lavished riches on the churches, and in 325 convened the Council of Nicea, which gives its name to our Nicene Creed.

Whether he himself was personally a sincere and committed Christian has always been a matter for discussion. His mother, St. Helena, certainly was, though.

Some think that Constantine compromised the prophetic mission of the Church by giving it money, status, and social influence. It became rather common that truly holy people did their best to avoid being made bishops.

Bishops

In 314, Constantine summoned western bishops to a synod in Arles in Provence. Three bishops from Britain were there, including, we think, the bishops of London and York. But we know very little about them.

The Council of Arles passed a number of canons (church laws). And in response to a pressing dispute, it moved towards the view that the Christian sacraments are effective even when they're administered by an unworthy person.

End of Roman Britain

As the fourth century wore on, the Roman Empire increasingly had to defend itself against both internal rebellions and external dangers, and in 410 the Empire withdrew its soldiers and administrators from Britain in order to relocate them to more strategic areas elsewhere. That marked the end of the period of Roman Britain.

This change opened the way for an Anglo-Saxon population to enter Britain, and for the introduction of a truly English Christianity. Hold tight for Chapter Four next month!

After Thanksgiving we will harvest them and Dawn and Wendy plan to make Green Tomato Relish which will be sold at the Bake Sale in December. Once the tomatoes are harvested the beds will be prepared for planting garlic in early November. The swiss chard and kale will be harvested well into November.
