

There was also a community yard sale, the proceeds of which were donated to the church.


Henri Nouwen - priest, professor, psychologist and writer

Henri Nouwen (1932-1996) remains one of the most popular and influential modern spiritual authors, writing more than 40 books. Born in the Netherlands, he was ordained as a Dutch Catholic priest before going on to study psychology, and teach at several theological institutes, including Harvard and Yale's divinity schools. In 1985 he began service in Toronto as the priest at the L'Arche Daybreak Community assisting people with developmental disabilities. It became his home until his sudden death at age 64. He is buried at St. John's Anglican Cemetery in Richmond Hill where L'Arche's woodworking shop restored an old wooden bench to place next to the plot for visitors.

Nouwen encouraged each individual to find one's own mission in life by asking: "Did I offer peace today? Did I bring a smile to someone's face? Did I say words of healing? Did I let go of my anger and resentment? Did I forgive? Did I love? These are the real questions."

His personal struggle with his sexual orientation was never acknowledged publicly, but, along with his bouts of depression, may have added empathy and depth to his writing.

"The greatest trap in our life is not success, popularity or power, but self-rejection," he related, later confirming that, "We are not what we do. We are not what we have. We are not what others think of us. Coming home is claiming the truth. I am the beloved child of a loving Creator. We no longer have to beg for permission from the world to exist."

Friday Morning Prayer Lunch




On March 8th some of the parishioners who attend Friday Morning Prayer got together for a Liver and Onion lunch at the Machu Picchu - 50s diner restaurant.

State of Terror

by Hillary Rodham Clinton & Louise Penny.

After a tumultuous period in American politics, a new administration has just been sworn in, and to everyone's surprise President Doug Williams chooses Ellen Adams, a political enemy, for the vital position of Secretary of State. It's a canny move on his part to silence one of his harshest critics, since Adams must step down as head of her multinational media conglomerate to take the position. But when a series of terrorist attacks throws the global order into disarray, the inexperienced Adams must show steely resolve in assembling a team to unravel the deadly conspiracy, a scheme carefully designed to take advantage of an American government dangerously out of touch and out of power in the places where it counts the most. Clinton's intimate knowledge of the State Department and foreign policy combines deftly with Canadian mystery novelist Penny's writing mastery to create a well-crafted thriller.

Freud's Last Session: screenplay by Mehmet Tumba.

Did Sigmund Freud and C.S. Lewis ever meet? Freud was known to have met with an Oxford don in the last days of his life, but that person's identity was never revealed. Tumba has written a screenplay (based on the stage play by Mark St. Germain), imagining such a meeting occurring just as WWII begins. Perhaps atheist Freud, painfully suffering from cancer and knowing his death is imminent, wants to hear what Christian C.S. Lewis has to say about the existence of God. This is the screenplay of the film version released in December 2023 starring Anthony Hopkins and Matthew Goode.

New Security Camera & Lighting Installation:

Enhancing Safety and Security at St. Cuthbert's

In today's unpredictable world, safety and security have become a top priority for churches. Thanks to the generous funds from the Ontario Anti-Hate & Security Grant in the amount of \$15,000, new security cameras have been installed in various areas, inside and out, around the church to ensure the safety of our parishioners, user groups and visitors.

Enhancing security in the church is not just about preventing external threats but also about safeguarding the parishioners, user groups and property. With the rise of unfortunate events such as theft, vandalism, and even hate crimes, having a reliable security system in place can provide peace of mind to both churchgoers, volunteers, and staff. By installing new security cameras, our church is taking proactive steps to ensure the safety of everyone who walks through our doors. In the event of an incident, the footage can be used to identify perpetrators and assist law enforcement in their investigations.

This added layer of security not only deters potential wrongdoers but also helps us respond swiftly to any emergencies.

The cameras can be accessed remotely via a secure online portal, enabling us to monitor the church premises from anywhere at any time. Moreover, the cameras are equipped with motion detection technology, which sends real-time alerts to our staff in the case of any unusual activity. The second key initiative funded by the Ontario Anti-Hate grant will be the installation of new outdoor lighting around the exterior of our church premises.

This project aims to improve visibility and deter potential wrongdoing during evening and nighttime hours. By strategically placing bright and energy-efficient lights around the property, we will be creating a safer environment for all who visit our church.


